The statutory the object of the Foundation is to strengthen peace and justice through providing material and immaterial support to vulnerable individuals, communities, civil society, and / or governments, whilst advocating for their rights. With that the Foundation contributes to enhancing our democracy, human rights, and security; and the prevention of future victims, in the broadest sense of the word.

JfP works to protect democratic societies, the rule of law, and the people targeted when these come under pressure. It focuses on actors and networks that exploit social divisions and vulnerable groups for political or financial gain, weakening public trust and democratic stability. JfP seeks to achieve its objectives, among others, through:

- A. Special projects: detecting manipulation early; investigating the actors, networks, and tactics behind it and publishing the results to inform the public and weaken the business model manipulation relies on; and developing tools that strengthen resilience.
- B. Cooperation: enabling cooperation between governments, civil society, academics, schools, faith leaders, and others, through information exchange, shared tools, and diplomacy.
- C. Strengthening targets: investing in the resilience of the public, students, voters, and institutions through training and education, and supporting those targeted by manipulation and intimidation.
- D. Obtaining gifts, legacies, funds, and subsidies.

How does the organisation generate income or revenue?

Our income comprises of grants, donations, gifts and assets inherited or received as a bequest or legacy; contributions; interest income, other income. These shall not exceed the financial resources reasonably required to ensure the continuity of the planned operations in furtherance of our objects. Financial resources required to ensure the continuity of the planned operations shall include: A. assets or asset components acquired under a will or through donation, either to be maintained in real terms or otherwise, in so far as maintenance thereof is required under the will or the conditions attached to the donation; B. asset components which must be maintained in so far as maintenance thereof is required given our objects; C. assets to be maintained and capital to be accumulated for the planned purchase of such assets, if reasonably required to further objectives. In 2025, revenues were spent within the framework described in the Deed and agreed with the Tax Authorities: on overhead (office rent, website design, hosting, and security) and on staff to carry out activities and implement projects. Remaining capital is held in savings and will be used to cover overhead and continued staff costs related to JfP's core activities only. A small buffer is maintained for unforeseen legal, cybersecurity, and operational contingencies.

In 2025 no revenues were spent on compensation of statutory board members for the performance of their statutory duties. Members of the board of the directors may also perform executive activities. For those, individual board members received remuneration based on available funding and for executive tasks only, in accordance with the deed and ANBI regulations. Hired staff were remunerated for their project activities.

In 2025 JfP continued its work investigating and exposing the networks that seek to undermine democratic stability, the rule of law, and the rights of vulnerable groups. Our work grew in scale and reached a wider audience than in previous years.

We published several substantial investigations into how anti-rights actors operate across borders, tracing their financing, narratives, and methods. These covered the use of international declarations as geopolitical leverage, the networks behind anti-rights campaigns targeting women and LGBTIQ+ people and the polarisation surrounding elections. We also investigated the growth of Defend groups in the Netherlands and their travel between towns to pressure local decision-making, and other work on disinformation and online manipulation. We refined our framework that maps how actors interact to convert public fear into influence and power.

2025 was also the year we expanded into Dutch-language work and stepped onto a more public stage to strengthen societal resilience. We contributed to television (documentaries), and appeared on radio, podcasts, stage, and in print. Faced with growing need closer to home, we narrowed our focus from a worldwide scope to Europe. Much of our work continued out of public view, through closed briefings and trusted partnerships that help protect democracy. In the coming year JfP intends to grow its investigative capacity and its early-warning role for the public, while keeping its independence and neutrality.

In line with expectations for a Public Benefit Organisation (ANBI), JfP carried forward €446.420 in liquid assets from 2025 into 2026, compared with €61.659 the year before. As in the prior year, these funds are earmarked in full. Of the €500.664 total, €491.930 is held as earmarked funds for specific donor projects, with the remainder reflecting the organisation's continuity and earmarked reserves, also tied to JfP's core objectives.

In 2025, JfP was funded through three sources: donations from private individuals, philanthropic support from organisations including Stichting Tanka, Stichting Weerbare Democratie (SWD), and SIDN, and project funding commissioned by parties such as the Nordic Council of Ministers, the Ministry of the Interior and Kingdom Relations (BZK), and IPPF.

Expenditure went primarily towards staff, office overhead, and the development of JfP's projects and investigative methodology, in service of both our public-facing output and our accountability to donors and partners.
